#### Winona Delegation at State Capitol

The Winona Area Chamber of Commerce sent a delegation of business leaders to St. Paul to participate in the annual Business Day at the Capitol, hosted by the MN Chamber.



The delegation met one-on-one with our local state legislators to advance our top priorities, toured the MN Capitol, and heard some additional legislative updates from the MN Chamber. As part of the MN Federation of Chambers, the Winona Chamber has adopted the 2019 Legislative Priorities:

Local chambers represent economic vitality in their communities. The Minnesota Chamber Federation unites and amplifies the voice of local chambers by advocating for policies to advance business in every corner of the state. Federation partners represent more than 43 communities and more than 21,000 businesses. They have worked to promote pro-growth policies to the Legislature for more than a decade, helping ensure that state lawmakers understand the needs and interests of Minnesota's diverse and successful local business community.

## The Federation has the following policy priorities for the 2020 legislative session:

#### **Workplace Management**

We are committed to providing the best workplaces for employees. This includes sharing employers' best practices so all businesses are aware of effective approaches to maintaining progressive workplaces to retain and compete for the best employees. Employers adhere to strict labor laws and workplace standards at the state and federal levels to maintain safe, healthy, respectful and inclusive workplaces. They must have flexibility to make staffing decisions and provide appropriate wages, benefits and schedules for their workplace and industry.

### We oppose "one size fits all" state mandates that limit employers' ability to design competitive benefit packages for their employees.

Minnesota has 853 cities and 87 counties. When local- level government bodies pass workplace mandates, it creates an administrative nightmare for employers and could cause unintentional errors subjecting businesses to legal action.

personal and corporate rate reductions, estate tax federal conformity and enhancement of the research and development tax credit.

We support tax relief for businesses that pay taxes through their personal tax returns and adopting federal conformity with Section 179 business expensing rules.

#### **Environmental Sustainability**

We recognize scientific consensus that the climate is changing due to human activity. Environmental sustainability and economic competitiveness, if done right, are not mutually exclusive.

We encourage the Legislature to recognize that state policies could result in disruption or discontinuation of business operations in Minnesota, considerably affect state and local economies, and may only marginally impact global environmental progress.

We support state policymakers pursuing policies that collectively enable a cleaner environment, recognize technological and economic limitations, consider implications to safety and reliability, support and advance innovation, maintain a secure economy and protect jobs.

We support environmental policies that drive private investment in Minnesota while helping employers reduce environmental impacts.

#### **Health Care**

Minnesota already requires health insurance policies to cover more than 60 benefits – one of the longest lists of required benefits in the country. Large employers tend to insure their workers under federal law. As a result, these state mandates negatively impact small employers. Research shows the average mandate increases premiums by .44% to 1.11% annually.

We support requiring a cost-benefit analysis before any proposal to add insurance mandates to state law.

#### **Education and Workforce Development**

Minnesota's education and workforce development efforts must align with employer needs, for our skilled workforce to continue to be a cornerstone of our competitive business climate. Systemic reforms are necessary to raise all student achievement, ensuring every high school graduate is ready for postsecondary education or a career.

We support private-sector initiatives to increase employer engagement in the training of workers in addition to supporting policies that ensure student readiness. Local chambers' private-sector led "Business Education Network" is connecting employers, students and learning institutions to local job opportunities and needed academic and training preparation for those jobs.

Students are better prepared for the future when they make meaningful career connections during their school years. Postsecondary and dual-credit programs provide high school students with credit toward certificates and degrees from high schools, two-year colleges and four-year universities, and should be promoted.

We support fostering and encouraging career exploration and hands-on training opportunities for students.

Postsecondary institutions and workforce programs should track and adapt to changes in the labor market and workforce needs. Access to work-based learning and career pathway resources should be expanded with

data-driven efforts including workforce supply and demand projections.

### We support state legislation that explicitly prohibits local government labor mandates.

As new laws and regulations are imposed on Minnesota's employers, enacting technical changes can create onerous compliance concerns.

We will pursue modifications to the 2019 wage theft law that has far-reaching, overly complicated requirements for employers.

#### **Tax Competitiveness**

Minnesota's high taxes continue to rank as a top barrier to economic growth, according to chamber members. Business taxes are among the highest in the nation in many categories. High taxes negatively impact innovation, entrepreneurship, talent recruitment and investment – the very catalysts needed to foster economic growth. The Minnesota Chamber Federation has a broad tax reform agenda including business property tax relief, We support using data to better understand training needs and high-demand careers. Transparency and accessibility improvements should be made to allow students to make informed decisions on the institutions and programs that best fit their needs.

**Chamber Federation** launches legislative agenda

Strike up a conversation with any business owner on the challenges to growing jobs in Minnesota, and the themes ring familiar.

High taxes hinder growth. Access to quality health care at an affordable price. The increasing number of government-mandates on employee benefits. Shortage of skilled workers.

Businesses of all types and sizes feel these stresses. Job-creators across the state hold their collective breath as the 2020 Legislature gets underway. Listen to those on the front lines as we seek ways to lessen these headwinds and create economic opportunity for all Minnesotans.

St. Cloud and River Heights are among the 40-plus members of the Minnesota Chamber Federation, which unites and amplifies the voice of local chambers by advocating for policies to grow business in every corner of the state. Together with the Minnesota Chamber, the Federation is launching its 2020 agenda as the Legislature gets underway.

Workplace regulations are center stage for St. Cloud businesses, says Teresa Bohnen, president of the St. Cloud Area Chamber of Commerce. Among their concerns is the broad wage theft law that, among other things, penalizes employers for unintentional payroll errors. "It seemed like the wage theft law sailed through last year without much consideration of the unintended consequences. Now we are requiring all businesses to absorb additional costs related to excessive paperwork and compliance to regulations that the vast majority of them were already following."

The Federation will pursue modifications in the wage theft law.

We also continue to oppose "one size fits all" state mandates that limit employers' ability to design competitive benefit packages for their employees. The patchwork of local mandates is cited in Inver Grove Heights.

"Many small businesses don't just work in one community," says Brenda Dietrich, co-owner of Hardline Concrete & Masonry. "When cities make their own legislation, such as mandating wages and benefits, it is a hindrance to small businesses."

Kari Rihm, president and chief executive of Rihm Family Companies, underscores the most widespread difficulty facing businesses: Finding workers. "Too few people are going into trades, and too many people are retiring from them." she says. "It's no secret. Businesses will be stymied if they can't hire enough experienced, skilled workers." The Federation continues to seek systemic reforms to raise all student achievement, ensuring every high school graduate is ready for postsecondary education or a career.

Local employer concerns resonate with Jennifer Gale, president of the River Heights Chamber. "We need to align our state's legislative policies with our desire to keep Minnesota competitive," she says. "Local chambers can work side by side with our legislators to connect them with business owners who know firsthand the everyday challenges."

Conforming Minnesota law with the federal Section 179 tax code tops our tax agenda to allow immediate expensing equipment purchases. Rounding out our priorities are requiring a cost-benefit analysis as part of any proposal to add insurance mandates to state law and supporting environmental policies that drive private investment in Minnesota while helping employers reduce environmental impacts.

Federation partners have collectively advanced employer priorities for more than a decade; they represent 43 communities and 21,000-plus businesses.
