Rising to the Challenge

How Winona Businesses Are Navigating Minnesota's New Labor Landscape

Minnesota's business climate is evolving—and for the hardworking entrepreneurs and employers across Winona, the pace of change is both swift and significant.

From sweeping new employee benefit mandates to increased wage requirements and inflation-indexed taxes, businesses of every size are being asked to do more, often with fewer resources and tighter margins. For many, these changes aren't just policy shifts, they're operational turning points.

One of the most far-reaching is the launch of Paid Family and Medical Leave (PFML) in 2026. The program promises up to 20 weeks of paid leave for qualifying family or medical needs, funded by a payroll tax shared between employers and employees or burdened by an employer on their own. While its intentions are rooted in compassion, the realities for small businesses are complex: How do you provide extended leave, retain talent, and maintain operations—all at once?

Layered onto this is Earned Sick and Safe Time (ESST), now in effect. Requiring one hour of paid leave for every 30 hours worked, this law applies to all employees—part-time, temporary, and seasonal alike—regardless of employer size. For small teams, it's not just an accounting adjustment; it's a reshaping of workforce management.

Then there's the elimination of the minimum wage exemption for small businesses and hospitality employers. This longstanding policy once gave relief to businesses

under a certain revenue threshold and allowed tip credits for service staff. Minnesota's move to do away with that—while other states continue to offer flexibility—has caused a spike in labor costs for some of our most community-rooted businesses. Restaurants, coffee shops, retailers, and independent service providers now face a steeper climb just to meet payroll.

All of this is unfolding against the backdrop of a tight labor market that leaves no room for error. With more open jobs than qualified applicants, Winona businesses are competing fiercely—not just on wages, but on culture, flexibility, and purpose. Today, the best talent doesn't just look for a paycheck. They look for values. And the businesses that prioritize people—those with healthy, empowering cultures—are winning.

Add in an inflation-indexed gas tax (raising transportation costs year over year) and the "captive audience" law (restricting employer communications on political or union-related matters), and the picture becomes even more complex.

At the Winona Area Chamber of Commerce, we understand the balancing act our members face. We believe in building strong communities and supporting workers—but we also believe in practical policy that strengthens, not stifles, the backbone of our economy: small businesses.

Our message is clear: Winona's businesses are not asking for a pass. They're asking for a partnership. One where growth, compliance, and sustainability go hand in hand.


